Shell Tucks

Shell tucks create a delicate edge finish for both lightweight knits and woven fabrics. Heirloom and lingerie sewers use this stitch on armholes and necklines because of its soft finish.

Ruched flowers, which give a 3-D effect, can also be made by incorporating this technique.

Machine Settings:







Foot: Satin Foot F

Needle Thread: All-Purpose Thread Bobbin Thread: All-Purpose Thread

- 1. Fold hem along the fabric bias.
- Place the fabric under the foot. Position the fabric so that the right side swing of the needle drops off at the fold of the fabric.
- 3. Lower the foot and start sewing.




Ruched Flowers

- 1. Cut different sized bias strips from fabric scraps 2.5 cm (1") larger than you want the finished flower to be.
- 2. Select the Shell Tuck stitch. Adjust stitch width, stitch length, and thread tension for each size as follows:
 - * Large Stitch width 7.0, stitch length 2.0, thread tension 8.2
 - * Medium.....Stitch width 6.0, stitch length 1.8, thread tension 8.6
 - * SmallStitch width 5.0, stitch length 1.5, thread tension 8.6
- 3. Fold down top and bottom edges 1.2 cm (1/2"), and press.

- 4. Sew a line of shell tucks along the top edge on the right side of the fabric.
- 5. Pull the bobbin thread and gather the fabric evenly, creating a petal effect.
- 6. Sew the ends of the fabric together to make a ring


Machine Settings:



Needle Position: Center

Stitch Length: 3.0

Thread Tension: 5.0



- 7. Set thread tension to 5.0, and stitch length to 3.0
- 8. Sew a line of straight stitches along the folded edge.
- 9. Pull the bobbin thread of the line of straight stitching to gather.
- 10. Flatten out the flower.
- 11. Arrange the gathers to even up the shape.
